Program Description

The Liberal Arts: Social Science and Humanities option in International Studies leads to an Associate in Arts (AA) degree.

As an interdisciplinary program that draws on the best resources of LaGuardia, we prepare students to become better-informed world citizens, helping them develop the competencies needed to survive and succeed in the new global world. Students in the International Studies program learn about cross-cultural understanding, explore global perspectives on various world issues and cultures, become more familiar with distinct regions and cultures of the world, and take at least two cycles of a foreign language. The option in International Studies promotes global awareness, intercultural understanding, and international engagement.

Why International Studies?

Our world has become globalized, with organizations, corporations, and individuals from around the world interacting on a daily basis. International Studies majors learn the importance of understanding and experiencing diverse cultures and the skills to work together on solutions to global challenges.

Many pressing societal issues require a multicultural solution, and most businesses, likewise, operate at an international level. International Studies is a way to expand both careers and horizons. The program aims to increase students' appreciation of the diverse cultures that make up our world and improve their understanding of the global phenomena that confront and shape the new generations. The degree serves as a stepping stone to an array of careers in various fields:

- Government jobs (development, energy, foreign service and intelligence)
- International organizations within and outside of the United Nations (peace negotiation, human rights, children's rights)
- Non-governmental organizations (humanitarian aid, human rights, public health, education and environmental issues)
- International banking and finance
- International business
- Interpretation
- Education and research
- Media

International Studies Curriculum: AA Degree

Our liberal arts curriculum provides a strong foundation in global and international studies. The curriculum is designed for students planning to transfer to baccalaureate programs with an international or global focus in such subjects as foreign language or literature, area studies, global studies and international studies. The courses required in the International Studies curriculum are designed to be transferable to other colleges and universities.

AA Degree Requirements for International Studies Option

Modern Language Study

Students who started in the academic year 2017-2018 are required to take 2 semesters of modern language, but 4 semesters are highly recommended. If you are interested in a course that isn't being offered in a certain semester, there is the possibility of an Independent Study; however, language learning is best in group situations. We offer courses in the following languages:

Multilingual and multicultural competence developed through foreign language learning is vital for better understanding and cooperation with other countries. Note that language learning requires assiduous effort, self-discipline, as well as systematic and serious time commitment. Please visit B-207 to take our in-house placement test to determine your proficiency in the languages you speak in addition to English. You are also encouraged to discuss your modern language study plans with the Program Director, Dr. Maria Savva in B-234.

Note: You are not limited to one modern language as we strive to help students develop multilingual abilities. Also, to maximize future career opportunities, you should aim to demonstrate proficiency beyond the 101-102 sequence in at least <u>one</u> modern foreign language.

Urban Study

One urban studies course is required by the college to complete graduation requirements.

Course Selection Advising

We recommend that you speak to the Program Director about your course selection, especially in the categories that allow choice.

If your interests in international studies are general, we recommended that you consult the 3-year Degree Accumulation Path for course sequencing and selection. However, our curriculum also allows for specialized area study within international studies. For example, in the catalogue year 2017-2018, a student interested in pursuing a degree in area studies, in addition to the **seven required courses [LIF 101, ENG 101, ENG 102, Math Course, Life & Phys Sciences Course, EIS 215, LIB 200]**, could build his/her selection of courses in the following way:
