## 2. Diversity Committee Report

## **High-level Review of Preliminary 2014-15 CUNY PMP Report**

#### Good News

### **Degree progress**

- Average number of <u>equated credits earned in one year</u> by first-time, full-time freshmen increased from last year to 22.2, above CC (21.0) and CUNY (20.7) averages (p. 10).
- Percent of students <u>earning at least 30 credits per year</u> went up to 20.3%, above CC (16.7%) and CUNY (15.2%) averages, second to KBCC (excluding Guttman, p. 12).
- Remediation completion in the first year is now 45.8% (p. 46), showing constant improvement and slightly above CC average (45.4%).

## **Full-time faculty**

• <u>Underrepresented faculty (pp. 39-40), up from last year and slightly above average for</u> minorities, but below average for Italian Americans.

#### Retention

One-year retention of first-time, full-time freshmen up to 66.1% (p. 16), slightly above CC and CUNY averages. LaGuardia also performed at the expected values for our student composition. (We are above, but not significantly, p. 17. Three other, regular CCs performed above.)

#### **Graduation, transfer and other outcomes** (see also challenges)

- Improved <u>four-year grad rate</u> for first-time, full-time to 24.2% (p. 21), above CC and CUNY averages, third among CUNY CC and Comp colleges. The six-year rate is down, but we are still in third place (p. 24). It appears that the Fall 2008 "Recession" cohort was bad for all colleges.
- Four-year graduation rate is above the expected rate for LaGuardia's student body (p. 22), meaning that we graduated students at the 24.2% rate even though, given these students' composite profile, we were expected to graduate only 19.2%. (Nevertheless, the calculation is tainted because it includes the comprehensives, and they drag down expectations. We suspect there is a problem handling their internal transfers.)
- In the 2012-13 AA/AS grad class, 69.5% transferred to four year schools, above CC average 68.6%, and tied for #3 among CUNY CCs (p. 48).
- <u>First semester GPA in four year schools</u> (whether or not they earned a degree) is the highest among all CUNY CC transfer students (2.76), and has been stable for three years in a row (p. 49).
- NCLEX pass rate went up again to 85.3%, 2nd highest among CCs (p. 50).

**Noel-Levitz** (Generally, we made progress on all aspects, but we are still at or below average. None of the indicators is the lowest.)

- Up from low on campus support services, now at CUNY and CC average (5.1, p. 26).
- Up from low on admission and financial aid services, now at 4.9 (but still below CC average 5.1, p. 27).
- Up from low on advising (now at 4.9, CC average 5.1 and CUNY average at 5.0, p. 25).
- Up from low on registration effectiveness (now at 5.1, CC average 5.3, p. 28).
- Up from low on service excellence (now at 5.1, CC average 5.2, p. 29).

#### **Revenue and finance**

- Grants and contracts awarded is #1 among CC, and #4 (rolling, p. 32 and 2015, p.33) in CUNY. That said, see challenges in grants and contracts.
- (Other financial factors are not yet available.)

## **Challenging News**

## Full time faculty

- <u>Percentage of instruction delivered by full-time faculty</u>, although up slightly to 40.4%, is quite a lot below CC (53.4%) and CUNY (48.6%) averages (p. 1).
- Student FTE to full-time faculty FTE, although down from 40.8—a CC high, is high at 36.6 FTE per faculty, above CC (32.7) and CUNY (27.0) averages. Only BMCC is higher (p. 3).
- Scholarship, although stable, is tied for lowest among CCs (0.3, p. 4).

#### **Graduation and transfer**

• <u>Six-year transfer</u> (grad or non-grad) to four-year schools is 30.2% for Fall 2008 first-time, full-time cohort, at CC average but with a slight decline from last year (p. 47).

#### **Grants and contracts**

- Down in <u>grants & contracts</u>. Three-year moving average and FY 2015 are still high, but declining (pp. 32-33).
- Down in <u>research</u> grants, both three-year rolling and FY 2015 (pp 7-8).
