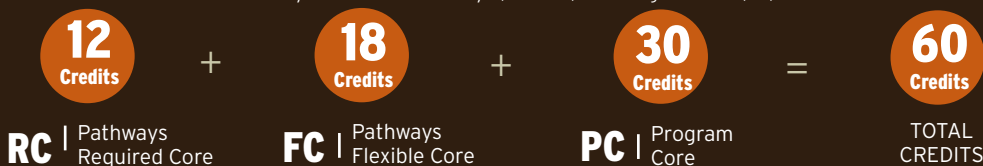

Co-requisite English

If you need to take developmental English, and are eligible for ENA101 or ENC101, follow the 1st SEMESTER sequence shown on the left to satisfy developmental needs and the ENG101 Required Core, and then see other side for the second semester and beyond.

Co-requisite Math

If you need to take developmental Math, and are eligible for MAT117 (equivalent if MAT115) or MAT119 (equivalent of MAT120), follow the 1st SEMESTER sequence shown on the left to satisfy developmental math and the Mathematics Required Core, and then see other side for the second semester and beyond.
