Liberal Arts: Social Science and Humanities International Studies Option AA Degree

Program Description

The International Studies Option prepares a diverse student body to become better informed world citizens, helping them develop the competencies needed to succeed and excel in a global world. Students in the program learn about cross-cultural understanding, explore global perspectives on various world issues, become more familiar with distinct regions of the world and take at least two semesters of foreign language. The Option is housed within Liberal Arts: Social Sciences and Humanities and students who successfully complete the program are awarded an Associate of Arts (AA) degree.

Why International Studies?

International Studies students learn about the global phenomena that confront and shape our modern world. They explore language, culture and identity issues through interdisciplinary lenses and develop the intercultural and collaborative skills necessary for tackling global challenges. Many pressing societal issues require multicultural solutions and many businesses, likewise, operate at international levels. Our liberal arts curriculum is designed for students planning to transfer to baccalaureate programs with an international or global focus in subjects such as foreign language or literature, area studies, global studies, development, journalism, international relations or human rights. The courses required in the International Studies curriculum are designed to be transferable to other colleges and universities. Students who complete the program express an interest in careers paths at various organizations:

Articulation Agreement with City College of New York/Transfer Services



The International Studies Option at LaGuardia Community College has a formalized articulation agreement with the Colin Powell School for Civic and Global Leadership at the <u>City College of New York</u>. This agreement includes easy transfer to the following tracks in the school's Anthropology, Gender Studies and International Studies Department: (1) Culture and Communication (2) Development (3) International Public Policy and (4) International Relations.

International Studies students at LaGuardia who have earned their Associate of Arts degree and have a GPA of 2.75 or higher can seamlessly transfer to any of these tracks at City College to complete a BA degree. Students transferring to City College can follow the regular program outlined in this handbook but should select from the following 100 and 200 level social science courses:

Social Sciences 100 Level: Students planning to transfer to CCNY should select SSA101 Cultural Anthropology.

Social Sciences 200 Level: Students planning to transfer to CCNY should select from the following courses: SSP200 Global Politics/Latin America AND/OR SSP250 Political Ideas & Ideology AND/OR SSI210 Women in Society.

Students planning to transfer to CCNY should also ensure that the two classes they take in modern language is *in the same language*.

Students who intend to transfer and pursue a Bachelor's Degree elsewhere in International Studies or a related field, should speak with a LaGuardia transfer counselor as soon as possible to plan the best pathway.

Scholarship and Study Abroad Opportunities

Schooling in Global Contexts which is a three-credit course that counts towards the Flexible Core requirements (World Cultures and Global Issues and/or Additional Core) OR the ENG/ELA/Humanities requirement. Students who enroll in the course will learn about CUNY study abroad programs that are available to them and will receive support preparing and writing study abroad scholarship applications to help fund their travels. Study Abroad scholarships for students who are US citizens include:

- Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program to study and intern abroad; awards available to U.S. undergraduates who might otherwise not participate due to financial constraints (open to students who receive PELL grants)
- <u>David L. Boren Scholarships and Fellowships</u> to study less commonly taught languages in world regions critical to U.S. interests and underrepresented in study abroad including Africa, Asia, Central and Eastern Europe, Eurasia, Latin America and the Middle East. Funding opportunities are available for U.S. undergraduate students (open to students who receive PELL grants).
- <u>The Critical Language Scholarship (CLS) Program</u> to experience summer overseas language and cultural immersion; fully funded program for American undergraduate and graduate students (anyone who is a US citizen can apply, income is not a factor for selection).
