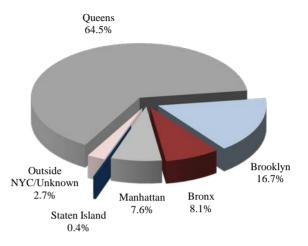

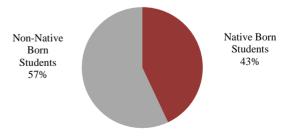

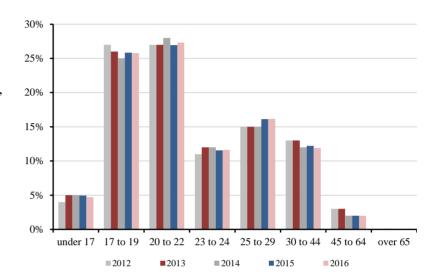

### Age Fall 2012 to Fall 2016

There is a wide range of ages in the credit-student population. About fifty-three percent of students were traditional college age in 2016 (between 17 and 22), and about five percent were younger. Nevertheless, about a quarter were well into their twenties, and another fourteen percent were 30 and over. The median age remains at 21, unchanged since Fall 2013, but one year younger than it had been for the twelve years up to Fall 2012.

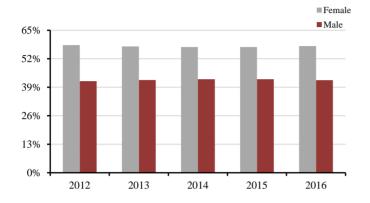

### Gender Fall 2012 to Fall 2016

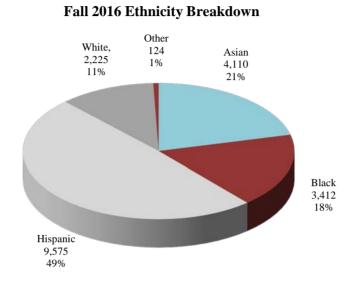
Similar to most colleges nationally, the majority of credit students at LaGuardia are women. In Fall 2016 the proportion of women in the student body was fifty-eight percent, lower than the high point in Fall 2005 when it was sixty-two percent. Among the different ethnic groups, however, the proportions of women and men vary substantially. For example, among Asian students, the gender distribution is nearly even.

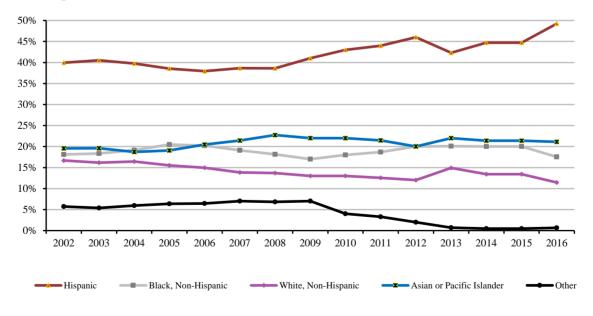

CUNY and federal race and ethnicity categories have shifted several times since 2002, making trend interpretation challenging. The shift out of the "other" category results from CUNY OIRA's use of an imputation algorithm based on zip code, last name and other factors to assign race to non-responses.



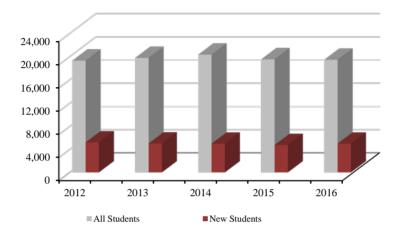
# Financial Resources 2016-2017

Fifty-seven percent of annual degree students (11,206 out of 19,832) were awarded some form of grant scholarship financial aid in 2016-17, forty-three percent of whom lived independently of their parents. Among full-time students, sixty-eight percent (9,368 out of 13,718) were awarded financial aid. Financial need is computed by subtracting a federally determined proportion of a student family's financial resources from the total cost of attendance. The gap between award and need rose from an average of \$9,384 in 2015-16 to \$11,243 for those living with parents and from \$11,960 to \$15,202 for those living away from parents. Students fund this gap by drawing on their family's resources in excess of the federal formula for "expected contribution" and by borrowing. Nearly nine percent of students on aid took out Direct Loans. About forty-nine percent of LaGuardia aided dependent student families earned less than \$25,000. Because of state and federal aid formulas, the financial gap for independent students was thirty-five percent larger than that of dependent students.

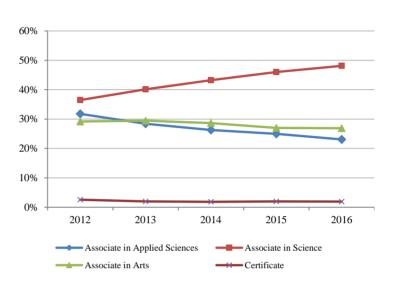

In Fall 2016 credit enrollment dropped slightly to 19,446, while the proportion of new credit student enrollment increased.

#### Credit Students by Degree Type Fall 2012 to Fall 2016

Over the past five years the proportion of Associate in Science (A.S.) credit students has increased twelve percentage points, while the proportion of students enrolled in occupational degree programs for the Associate in Applied Sciences (A.A.S.) degree has fallen nine percentage points. The proportion of non-degree students also decreased slightly.

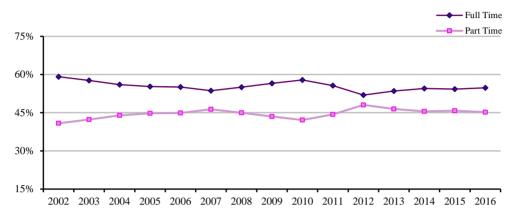

#### Credit Students by Full-Time and Part-Time Status Fall 2002 to Fall 2016

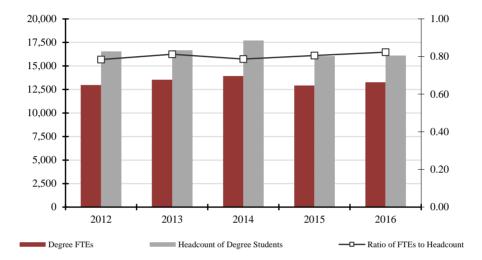


In Fall 2016 fifty-five percent of the student body was full-time. In 1976, seventy percent of students were full-time, but by 2007 the proportion had fallen to fifty-four percent. The climb to fifty-eight percent in 2010 was short-lived. Since 2002 the number of full-time students has increased 43%, while the number of part-time students has increased 71%.

#### Full-Time Equivalents (FTEs) Compared to Number of Students Enrolled Fall 2012 to Fall 2016



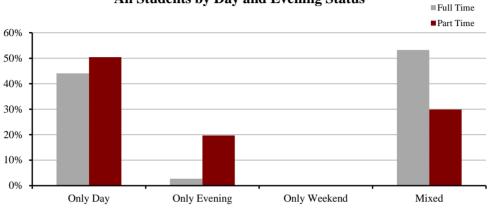

Part-time students took an average of 6.9 equated (college-level and non-college-level) credits in Fall 2016, while full-time students took an average of 15.6 equated credits. These averages were unchanged from Fall 2015.

Note: Here we use the Full Time Equivalent course load of 15 credits to calculate FTEs. This differs from the definition of a full-time student which is an attempted credit and/or equated credit load of 12 or more. Previous editions were not limited to degree students. 2015 has been revised from previous editions.

### **Credit Students** by Day and Evening Fall 2016



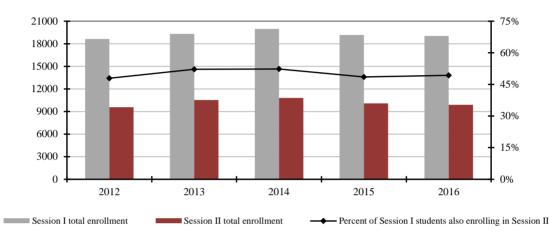

Evening courses are those that begin after 5:45 PM on weekdays. If a student had no weekday courses beginning after 5:45 PM and no weekend courses, that student was counted in the "Only Day" course schedule group. Likewise, if a student had no courses that began before 5:45 PM and no weekend courses, that student was counted in the "Only Evening" course schedule group. Students with mixed schedules, that is, some day courses, some evening courses, and perhaps even a weekend course, were put in the "Mixed" schedule category. For no clear reason, the proportion of Only Day students swings from year to year with even years as high as 52% and odd years as low as 42%.

#### Fall Enrollment by Session Fall 2012 to Fall 2016

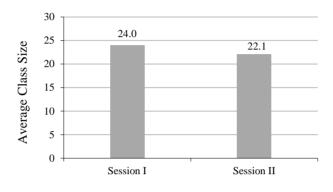

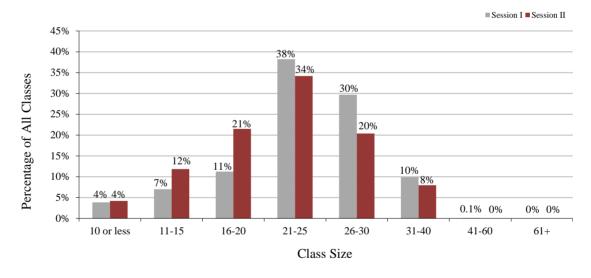

LaGuardia offers classes on a two-semester basis, fall and spring, each year with each semester divided into two sessions, I and II. The four annual sessions run consecutively and do not overlap. Each Session I lasts twelve weeks, while each Session II lasts six. The weekly schedule of Session II can thus be more intensive for a similar credit load. Many students take a full semester load spread over Session I and Session II. The semester/session calendar allows students more flexibility in scheduling with four possible start dates. The possibility of spreading a semester's load over 18 weeks also allows students to schedule class and work time more efficiently. For Fall 2016, fortynine percent of session I students also enrolled in Session II.

#### Average Class Size by Session

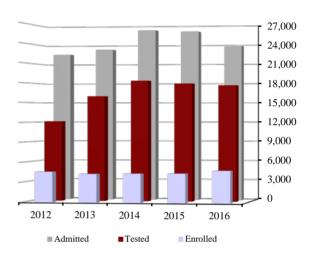


#### **Class Size Distribution by Session**

The average class in Session I of Fall 2016 enrolled 24 students, while the average class in Session II enrolled 21.1 students. Session I class size is slightly higher than Fall 2015 but has the same average as Fall 2007.

#### New Admitted vs. Tested vs. Enrolled Degree-Seeking Students Fall 2012 to Fall 2016

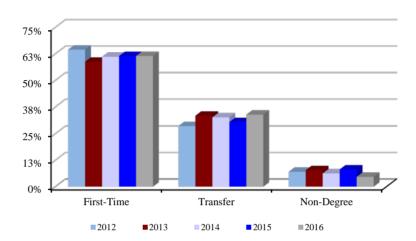
Applicants who are admitted to LaGuardia pass through the City University admissions system. Applicants list their preferences for particular CUNY schools. CUNY allocates applicants to each college in multiple phases. In 2012 during the transition to the CUNY first system, the college, working within a university system where students can be admitted to multiple schools, was not able to maintain a consistent definition of an admitted student. The increased applicant pool and number of students tested did not change enrollments.

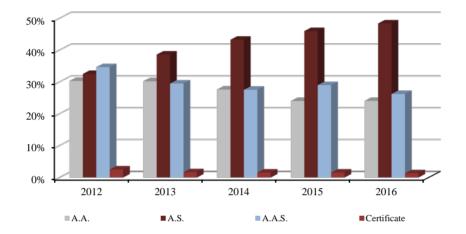
by First-Time, Transfer, and Non-Degree Status Fall 2012 to Fall 2016

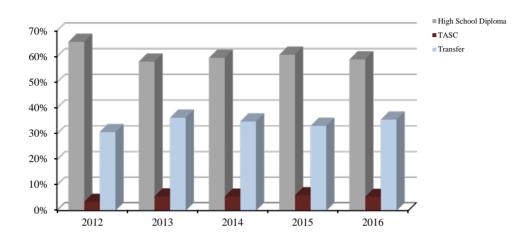

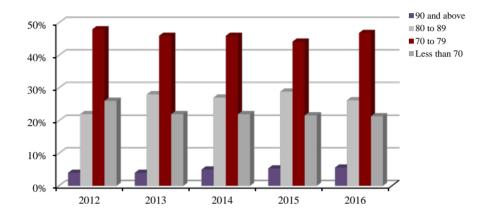

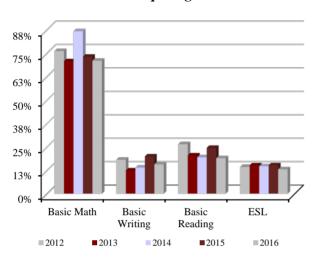

#### Basic Skills Needs First-Time Degree-Seeking Students, Fall 2012 to Fall 2016



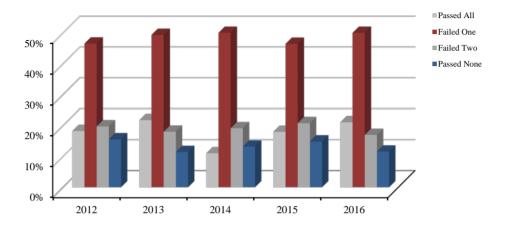
Percent Requiring Basic Skills

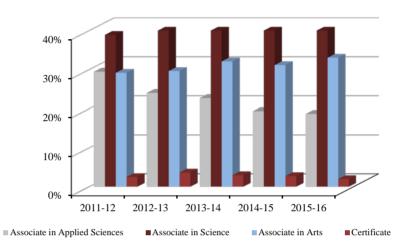

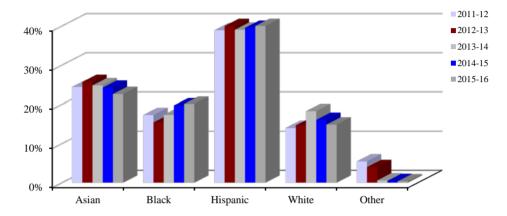

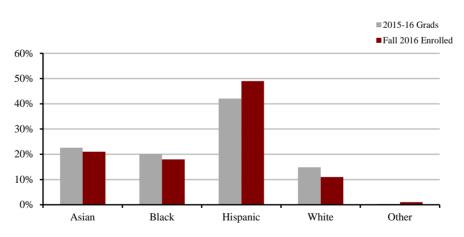

#### Degrees Awarded by Race and Ethnic Origin\*



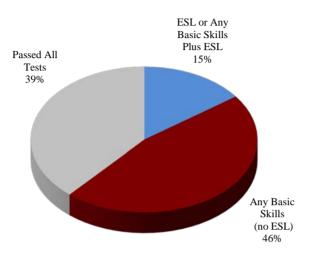

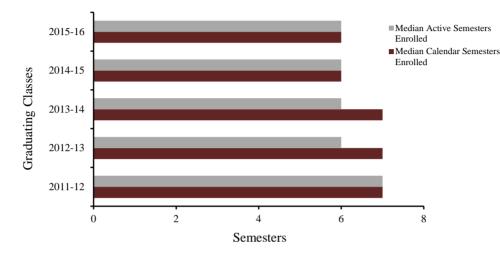
#### Degrees Awarded by Entering Basic Skills Status Five-Year Trend



Many graduates in the past five years took basic skills or English-as-a-Second-Language (ESL) courses when they first began their studies at LaGuardia. Among the 2015-16 graduating class, sixty-one percent of graduates had begun in basic skills or ESL courses. In Fall 2011 twentyone percent of new students passed all developmental placement tests, while fourteen percent were required to take ESL courses. The proportion of "Passed All Tests" now graduating is about twice the proportion of those new students who passed all tests in the entering class of Fall 2011, four years earlier.

The time to degree increased from 2014-15 to 2015-16. The average LaGuardia 2015-16 graduate finished more than seven semesters after first enrolling. During one of those semesters, the average graduate stopped out, but, examing the median, at least half did not stop out at all. Averages are higher than medians because of the impact of those few students who may have taken a dozen semesters, including many stop-out semesters. Graduates from the last five years averaged seven and four-tenths semesters, or a little over three and one-half years, to obtain their degrees. However, for one semester of that time, students on average were not actively taking classes.

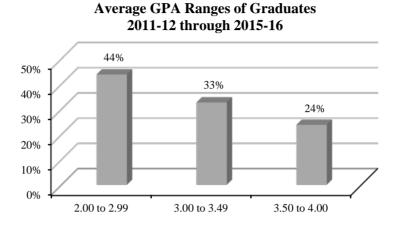

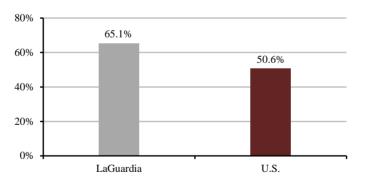
#### GPAs of Graduates

#### Baccalaureate Transfer Rate of Graduates

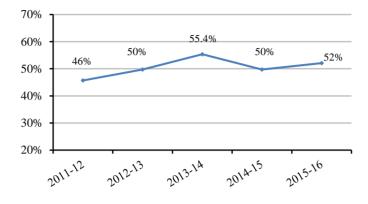

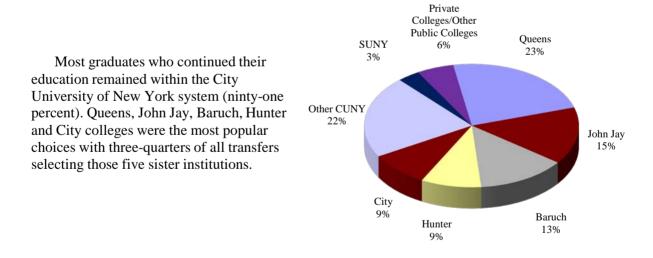
#### Five-Year Trend of One-Year Transfer Rates

#### Destinations of Graduates

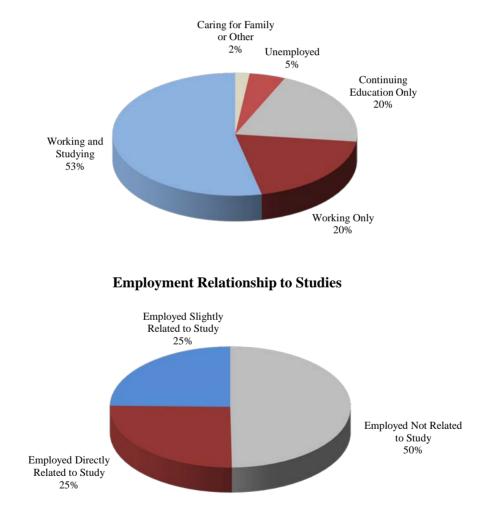

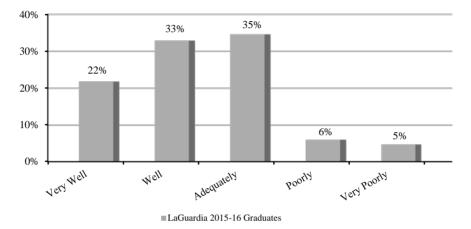
Six-months after graduation, ninety-three percent of the 2015-16 graduates surveyed were either working, continuing their education, or both. Fifty percent of those employed alumni reported that their jobs related to their studies. The number of immediate graduates who were unemployed was two percentage points lower than that of the previous year. The number of immediate graduates who reported working and studying concurrently increased to 53 percent - eight percentage points higher than that of the previous year. The overall proportion of immediate graduates pursing additional education remained stable.

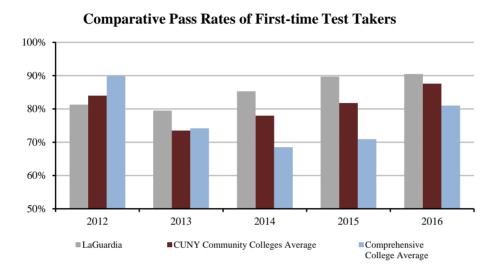
Nearly 90 percent of LaGuardia 2015-16 graduates reported that their educational experience prepared them adequately, well or very well for the jobs they held immediately after graduation.

The average starting salary of those 2015-16 alumni responding to the survey was \$28,536, up slightly from last year.

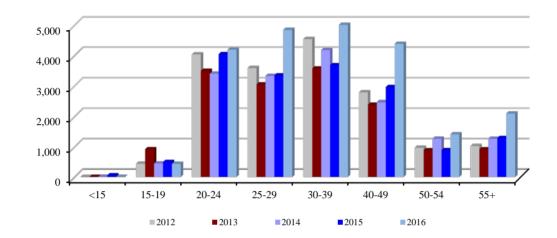

by Age Fall 2012 to Fall 2016



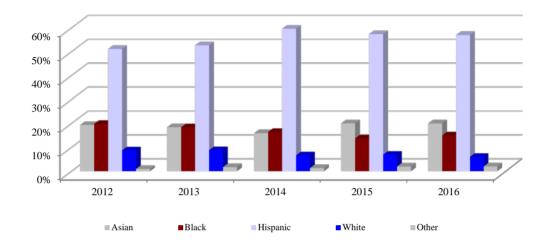

#### ACE Enrollment by Race and Ethnic Origin Fall 2012 to Fall 2016



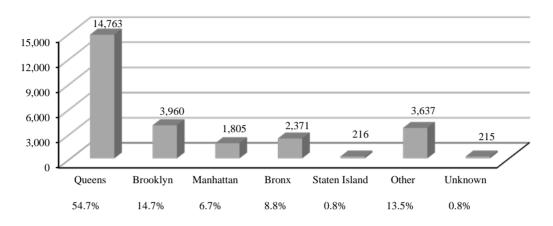

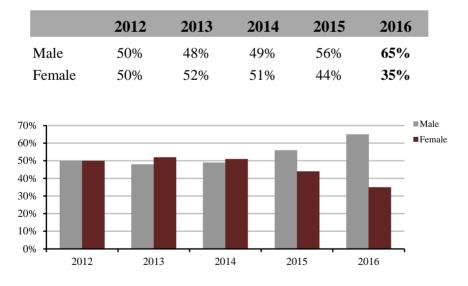
## Adult and Continuing Education

#### by Gender Fall 2012 to Fall 2016

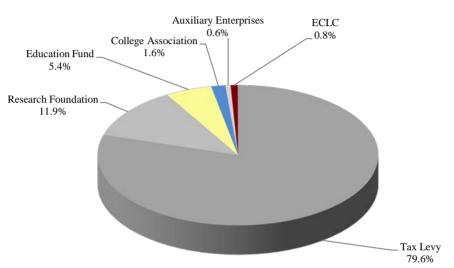

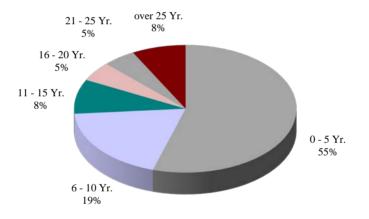
Full Time Tax Levy Employees by Job Category and Age Range, Fall 2016

by Job Category and Years in Current Title, Fall 2016

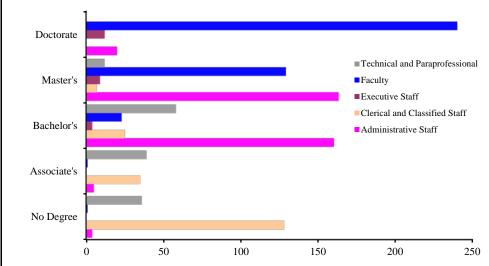


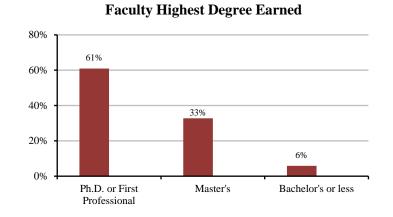
Workforce Percentages by Years in Current Title, Fall 2016

#### Full Time Tax Levy Employees by Job Category and Highest Degree Earned, Fall 2016



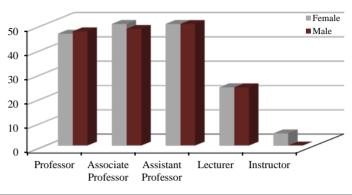

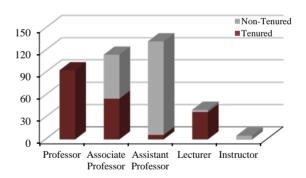

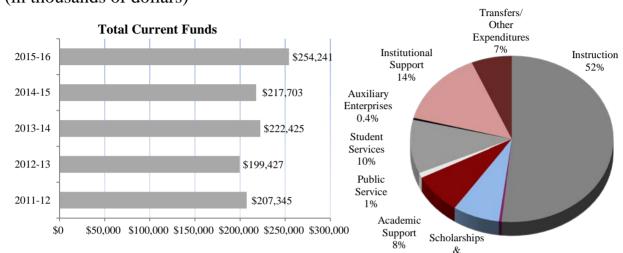

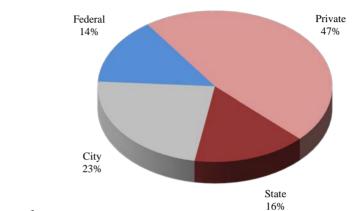

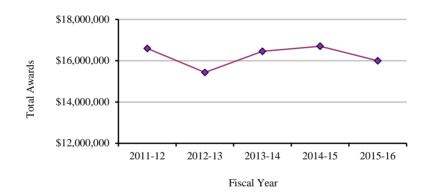
### Grant Awards by Source

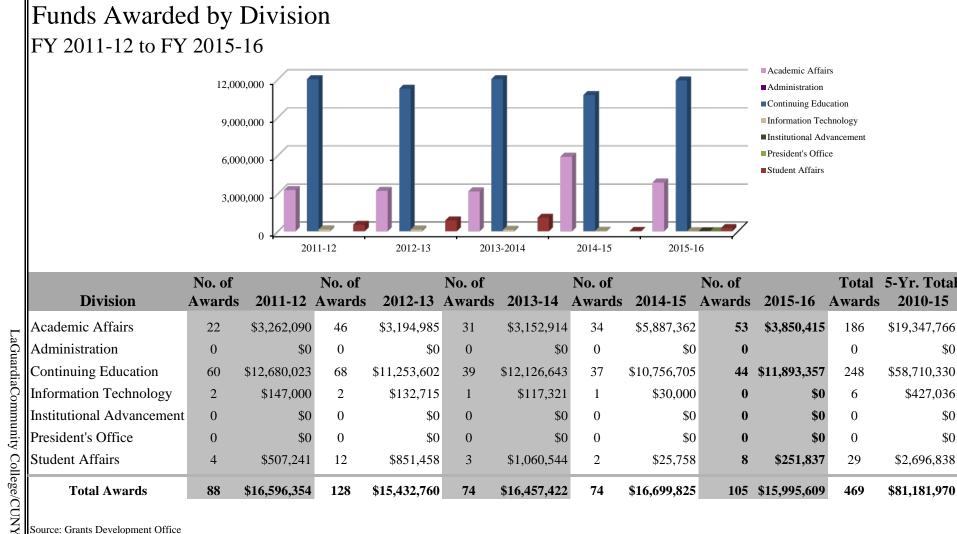

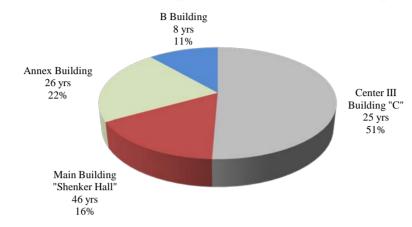

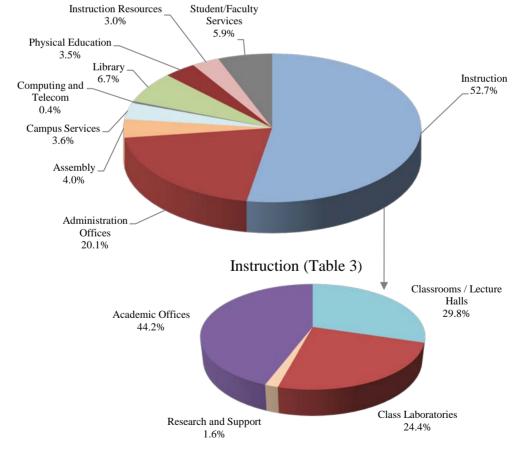
