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






#### Neighborhoods in Queens







#### Age Fall 2011 to Fall 2015

There is a wide range of ages in the credit-student population. About fifty-three percent of students were traditional college age in 2015 (between 17 and 22), and about five percent were younger. Nevertheless, about a quarter were well into their twenties, and another fourteen percent were 30 and over. The median age remains at 21, unchanged since Fall 2013, but one year younger than it had been for the twelve years up to Fall 2012.

### Gender Fall 2011 to Fall 2015


Similar to most colleges nationally, the majority of credit students at LaGuardia are women. In Fall 2015 the proportion of women in the student body was fifty-seven percent, lower than the high point in Fall 2005 when it was sixty-two percent. Among the different ethnic groups, however, the proportions of women and men vary substantially. For example, among Asian students, the gender distribution is nearly even.




# Financial Resources 2015-2016

Fifty-six percent of annual degree students (11,503 out of 20,372) were awarded some form of grant scholarship financial aid in 2015-16, forty-three percent of whom lived independently of their parents. Among full-time students, sixty-nine percent (9,689 out of 14,043) were awarded financial aid. Financial need is computed by subtracting a federally determined proportion of a student family's financial resources from the total cost of attendance. The gap between award and need rose from an average of \$6,339 in 2014-15 to \$9,384 for those living with parents and from \$11,960 to \$13,424 for those living away from parents. Students fund this gap by drawing on their family's resources in excess of the federal formula for "expected contribution" and by borrowing. Eight percent of students on aid took out Direct Loans. About fifty-eight percent of LaGuardia aided dependent student families earned less than \$25,000. Because of state and federal aid formulas, the financial gap for independent students was forty-three percent larger than that of dependent students.



In Fall 2015 credit enrollment dropped by four percent to 19,517. The proportion of new credit student enrollment also declined, explaining thirty percent of the overall drop.

#### Credit Students by Degree Type Fall 2011 to Fall 2015

Over the past five years the proportion of Associate in Science (A.S.) credit students has increased twelve percentage points, while the proportion of students enrolled in occupational degree programs, the Associate in Applied Sciences (A.A.S.), has fallen nine percentage points. The proportion in Associate in Arts (A.A.) decreased for the first time since 2005. The proportion of nondegree students rose to a new high as well, fueled by growth in the College Now program.




#### Credit Students by Full-Time and Part-Time Status Fall 2001 to Fall 2015



In Fall 2015 fifty-four percent of the student body was full-time. In 1976, seventy percent of students were full-time, but by 2007 the proportion had fallen to fifty-four percent. The climb to fifty-eight percent in 2010 was short-lived. Since 2001 the number of full-time students has increased 71%, while the number of part-time students has increased 98%.


Most of the decline is the result of a decrease in average credit load among part-time students. The decreasing credit load of degree students increases their time to degree and reduces the likelihood of graduation.

### Credit Students by Day and Evening Fall 2015





Evening courses are those that begin after 5:45 PM on weekdays. If a student had no weekday courses beginning after 5:45 PM and no weekend courses, that student was counted in the "Only Day" course schedule group. Likewise, if a student had no courses that began before 5:45 PM and no weekend courses, that student was counted in the "Only Evening" course schedule group. Students with mixed schedules, that is, some day courses, some evening courses, and perhaps even a weekend course, were put in the "Mixed" schedule category. Forty-two percent of LaGuardia students take only day courses, while fifty-two percent of LaGuardia students have some day and some evening courses. Compared to Fall 2014, full-time students taking only day courses decreased seven percentage points.

#### Fall Enrollment by Session Fall 2011 to Fall 2015





LaGuardia offers classes on a two-semester basis, fall and spring, each year with each semester divided into two sessions, I and II. The four annual sessions run consecutively and do not overlap. Each Session I lasts twelve weeks, while each Session II lasts six. The weekly schedule of Session II can thus be more intensive for a similar credit load. Many students take a full semester load spread over Session I and Session II. The semester/session calendar allows students more flexibility in scheduling with four possible start dates. The possibility of spreading a semester's load over 18 weeks also allows students to schedule class and work time more efficiently. For Fall 2015, forty-nine percent of session I students also enrolled in Session II.

#### Class Size by Session Fall 2015




#### Average Class Size by Session



The average class in Session I of Fall 2015 enrolled 23.3 students, while the average class in Session II enrolled 21.4 students. By comparison, the average class size in 2014 was 24.9 students in session I and 22.7 students in session II. Since Fall 2007 the average Session I class size has decreased by about one student.

### New Admitted vs. Tested vs. Enrolled Degree-Seeking Students Fall 2011 to Fall 2015


Applicants who are admitted to LaGuardia pass through the City University admissions system. Applicants list their preferences for particular CUNY schools. CUNY allocates applicants to each college in multiple phases. In 2012 during the transition to the CUNYfirst system, the college, working within a university system where students can be admitted to multiple schools, was not able to maintain a consistent definition of an admitted student. Beginning in 2012 any student who indicated LaGuardia as one of six CUNY choices was counted as admitted, if qualified. The increased applicant pool and number of students tested did not change enrollments.


by First-Time, Transfer, and Non-Degree Status Fall 2011 to Fall 2015













#### Degrees Awarded by Race and Ethnic Origin\*






#### Degrees Awarded by Entering Basic Skills Status Five-Year Trend



Many graduates in the past five years took basic skills or English-as-a-Second Language (ESL) courses when they first began their studies at LaGuardia. Among the 2014-15 graduating class, sixty percent of graduates had begun in basic skills or ESL courses. In Fall 2010 twenty-two percent of new students passed all developmental placement tests, while eighteen percent were required to take ESL courses. The proportion of "Passed All Tests" now graduating is more than twice the proportion of those new students who passed all tests in the entering class of Fall 2010, four years earlier.

The time to degree dropped for the first time in several years. The typical LaGuardia 2014-15 graduate finished seven semesters after first enrolling. During one of those semesters, the average graduate stopped out. Averages are higher than medians because of the impact of those few students who may have taken a dozen semesters, including many stop-out semesters. Graduates from the last five years averaged seven and four-tenths semesters, or a little over three and one-half years, to obtain their degrees. However, for one semester of that time, students on average were not actively taking classes.




#### GPAs of Graduates

Percentage of Fall 2008 Full-Time Freshmen Graduating with Associate's Degrees Who Transferred to Baccalaureate Colleges Within Six Years




#### Five-Year Trend of One-Year Transfer Rates

One year after graduation, fifty percent of the 2014-2015 graduating class had transferred to four-year colleges.


#### Destinations of Graduates


Six-months after graduation, ninety-one percent of the 2014-15 graduates surveyed were either working, continuing their education, or both. 
#### Post-Graduation Employment Satisfaction and Starting Salary


LaGuardia 2014-15 graduates were largely satisfied with the jobs they held immediately after graduation.



by Age Fall 2011 to Fall 2015





#### ACE Enrollment by Race and Ethnic Origin Fall 2011 to Fall 2015








#### ACE Enrollment by Borough Fall 2015

#### by Gender Fall 2011 to Fall 2015






#### Tax Levy Employee Headcounts



#### Full Time Tax Levy Employees by Job Category and Age Range, Fall 2015





by Job Category and Years in Current Title, Fall 2015




Workforce Percentages by Years in Current Title, Fall 2015







### Tenure Track Faculty by Tenure Status Fall 2015



#### Library Operations FY 2010-11 to FY 2014-15









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
